The Best Rx: EXERCISE

When it comes to preventing heart disease, regular exercise is one of the most powerful tools at your disposal, experts say— as statin drugs. Women who exercise briskly at least three hours per week slash their risk of heart attack by 30 to 40 percent, according to the ongoing, massive Nurses’ Health Study.

Heart-pumping aerobic exercise lowers bad cholesterol while raising the good kind, demolishes triglycerides, and prevents plaque from accumulating inside arteries. It also combats dangerous abdominal fat. But you don’t need to join a gym. Studies show that exercise is just as effective when done in discrete chunks throughout the day – climbing the stairs, taking a fast walk at lunch, or walking to a friend’s home.

We have put a number of new books on the shelves this month—the ‘girls’ have been busy shelving and we are most grateful for that! What we need now is a room-stretcher— we will be doing some ‘weeding out’ after the first of the year and that will make more room.

Odds and ends this month— remember “Masterpiece Theatre”? We have two ‘new’ copies of “Upstairs, Downstairs” - volumes I and II— you might be interested in recalling the story of the Bellamy family.

We also have a new Dick Francis— “Under Orders” (LP/M/FRA). Quoting the cover, “Sadly, death at the races is not uncommon. However, three in a single afternoon was sufficiently unusual to raise more than one eyebrow.” We have a number of Dick Francis readers among our residents, so come on down!

“Pushing Up Daisies” by Rosemary Harris (M/HAR) is a delightful mystery for those of us who don’t like the gory stuff. Paula Holliday, who has traded her stilettos for garden clogs when she transferred from the media business to living in the suburbs, finds a mummified body while restoring the grounds at Halcyon, a local landmark. Casual snooping turns serious when a body is impaled on a garden tool and one of Paula’s friends is arrested. Of course we all know who the culprit is (don’t you dare turn to the last page) and life goes on.

I confess I have not read “White Hats” by Floyd Beaver (F/BEA) but became intrigued by the book when working on it. It is a collection of World War II episodes involving our sailors, sea stories, war stories and even some of the history of the U.S. Navy. Easy reading, anecdotal, and you old Navy sailors will surely enjoy it.

Another new one is “Mothers of Influence” in the Honor Books collection (920/HON). Short, semi-chapters (two pages each), the book includes the mothers of a variety of current and former well-known people such as Billy Graham, C. S. Lewis, Mother Teresa, Sam Walton, the Kennedy’s, and other political figures. Among its 95 mothers, 30 are from the Bible. It might be interesting to read around Mothers Day and reflect on your own mother.

We have a new group of six paperback mysteries by Alexander McCall Smith (M/SMI) entitled “The No.1 Ladies’ Detective Agency” and each book has its own title. I have not read any of these, and would be delighted to have you review one. We will print it in a future edition of the MAHOVA NEWS. Incidentally, the publisher reminds us the books are now an HBO Series.

Next month we will print Richard Neiswander’s review of David McCullough’s “John Adams”. Big book, thick book, but very interesting. The Adams family is very important in the history of our country. Be looking forward to it.
